STUDENT HANDBOOKS:

PARKING:

Please note that Parking Lot A is reserved for faculty and staff parking. Ample parking for students is available in Lots B, C, and D. Please observe all posted signs and traffic regulations as outlined in the Student Handbook.

BUS SERVICE:

Columbia Junior College buses will be picking up students from the Jamestown area, Pinecrest, San Andreas and Arnold. Schedules are printed in the Student Handbook.

IDENTIFICATION CARDS:

Student Identification cards will be required for checking out library books, audio-visual equipment and materials. If you have not obtained your identification card, please go to the Instructional Materials Center in the Learning Resource Center to have your picture taken and fill out the information for your card. Bring your driver's license or some other proof of your birthdate. The office will be open from 8:30 to 11:00 a.m. and from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. The fee for the card is \$1.00.

American College Testing (ACT) will be given at Columbia Junior College in December and February.

General Education Development (GED) tests are given at Columbia Junior College as needed by students.

ADDITIONAL BUS SERVICES:

Due to the lack of ample parking facilities for students, additional bus services will be provided starting Wednesday, October 6.
