ROOTS (ANIMAL VERSION):

The Library has recently added to its collection the Grzimek's Animal Life Encyclopedia. This 13-volume set covers the entire animal kingdom, but devotes greater attention to birds and mammals than to the lower orders. Conservation and the protection of endangered species are special concerns of Grzimek, whether dealing with reef corals, crocodiles, birds, or large mammals. Efforts to provide this protection are given special attention. Relationships of the various animals to one another are described throughout the entire work with particular emphasis placed on the relationships between man and the other animals. Even man's myths about certain animals, such as the cat, dolphin, mouse, rattlesnake or squirrel are discussed. Included in the set are approximately 8,000 black and white drawings and 1,300 color photographs. Although there is no overall index to the set, each volume is on a different order of animals and contains its own thorough index. It is shelved in the Reference section of the Library: QL 3 G7813.
