TRANSFERRING?

Are you applying for transfer to the California State College and/or the University of California system(s) during the next academic year? If so, the initial application filing dates are as follows for the University of California system, 1981-82: Fall Quarter or Semester 1981: File November 1-30, 1980; Winter Quarter 1982: File July 1-31, 1981; Spring Quarter or Semester 1982: File October 1-31, 1981 (you can still file for Spring 1981: October 1-31, 1980) Filing dates are as follows for the California State Colleges and University System, 1981-82: Summer Quarter 1981: File February 1, 1981; Fall Semester or Quarter 1981: November 1-31, 1980; Winter Quarter 1981: June 1-30, 1981; Spring Semester or Quarter 1981: August 1-30, 1981. After these priority dates, campuses will continue to accept applications as their enrollment quotas allow.

CALIFORNIA ALUMNI ASSOCIATION, U.C. BERKELEY SCHOLARSHIPS:

Junior transfers (Fall 1981) to U.C. Berkeley with an overall G.P.A. of 3.3 or better are eligible for alumni scholarships. If you are interested, complete item 27 of the Application for Undergraduate Admission. The Office of Financial Aid will then send you the necessary information and documents for financial aid and/or scholarships. You have the option of applying for need based aid or honorary scholarships (the latter not to exceed \$300). Applications are due during the month of November 1980.

CHICO SCHOLARSHIP:

Any student who transfers to California State University, Chico, as an agriculture major may be eligible for scholarships ranging from \$100-\$600. Please check with Elsie Bruno in the Student Services area for application criteria and procedures. Applications are due Friday, October 31, 1980.

HARRY S. TRUMAN SCHOLARSHIP:

Students who will be transferring as juniors in the Fall of 1981 and enrolled at any college or university where they will pursue an undergraduate field of study that will permit admission to a graduate program leading to a career in government are eligible for this scholarship. Additional criteria include a 3.0 G.P.A., U.S. citizenship, full-time enrollment during the 1980-81 academic year, demonstrated interest in public service and outstanding potential for leadership in government. The scholarship covers tuition, books, fees and room and board to a maximum of \$5,000 annually. Columbia College may nominate two students to compete nationally for the award.
