STUDENT SCHEDULES

Students who have completed registration for Fall Semester will find their class schedules on the table outside the Admissions and Records Office.

LATE REGISTRATION ADVISEMENT

A counselor will be in the Rotunda of the Learning Resources during the first week of Fall Semester from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. to assist new students who have not completed registration for this term. Advisors and counselors for continuing students can be located in their offices.

TEN DOLLAR (\$10) DROP FEE

Students dropping a course(es) will be charged a drop fee of ten dollars (\$10) per course, not to exceed a total amount of twenty dollars (\$20) for one or more courses (credit or non-credit) anytime after two weeks from the beginning of instruction. Contact the Admissions and Records Office for further details.

EVENING ADVISING

Evening advising will be available Monday through Thursday during the first two weeks of Fall Semester. Students may call for an appointment (533-5125) or come by the Admissions and Records Office between 6:00 to 7:30 p.m.

PARKING

A parking fee of 50¢ per day or \$15 per semester will be charged to all students, faculty and staff. Parking permits may be purchased in the College Business Office (located in the Learning Resources Center). If you do not wish to purchase a permit, you will be charged 50¢ each day you bring your vehicle on campus. Motorcycles and motorbikes will be charged the same as other vehicles.

Parking Lots A, B, C, and D are available for student parking. Please observe all posted signs and traffic regulations. Violators of parking regulations are subject to receiving a citation or having their vehicles towed away at the owner's expense.


