If you are interested in serving as a non-voting member of the Board of Trustees for the 1985-86 school year, you may pick up an application from the ASCC President or in the Student Activities Office. In order to be eligible, you must: 1) Be a legal resident of the Yosemite Community College District at the time of application and during the time of service on the Board (September 1, 1985-June 30, 1986); 2) Be enrolled in a minimum of 12 units during the semester and during each semester of service; 3) Be in good academic standing (not on probation) and have earned a GPA of 2.5 or more in at least 12 units. In the absence of an established GPA based on prior work, the most recent mid-term GPA or average of grades to date will be accepted. The deadline for application is Friday, August 23, 1985, at 3:30 p.m.

TEN DOLLAR (\$10) DROP FEE

For this Fall Semester, August 30 is the last day to withdraw from class without being charged the drop fee. Contact the Admissions and Records Office for further details.

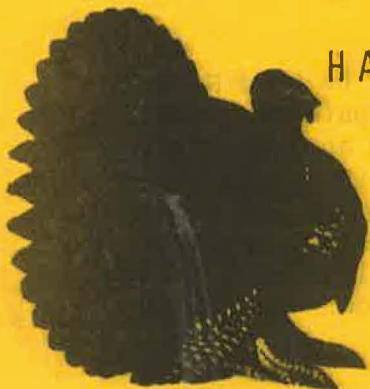
