The Columbia College staff is available to the student for assistance in meeting requirements and following procedures; but, the student is ultimately responsible for his/her academic program.

AUTHORIZATION

The State has authorized fees to be assessed for health services. The Yosemite Community College District Board of Trustees has authorized a fee not to exceed \$7.50 per semester and \$5 per Summer Session effective Spring Semester, 1988.

HEALTH FEE

A. Credit Students

1/2 - 7.5 credit units = \$1.00 per unit 7.5+ credit units = maximum \$7.50

B. Community Services Students

Five cents per student per hour of class time or by a set fee established for an activity. The amount will be placed at the nearest dollar figure (example: \$1, \$2, \$3, etc.).

C. Non-Credit Students

No fee will be charged for Spring 1988.

EXEMPTIONS

- 1. Low income students who qualify for Board of Governor's Financial Assistance Program (BOG).
- 2. Non-credit students.
- 3. Students who qualify due to religious affiliation. These students may petition to the Dean of Student Services.

REFUNDS

- 1. If the College cancels a class, the student will receive a full refund for that class.
- 2. If the student drops a class AND completes an official drop slip AND refund slip in the Admissions and Records Office during the first two weeks of class ONLY.

SERVICES

Students will have access to health services daily from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings from 5:30 to 8:00. A physician is also available on Fridays from 10 a.m. to noon. Appointments to see the doctor may be scheduled with the nurse.



If you want to apply for a fee waiver for the first time, you need to complete the blue application form located in the Financial Aid and/or Admissions Offices; then take it to the Financial Aid Office before you register for classes. The Financial Aid Office will receive your application Monday-Friday from 10 a.m. - 2 p.m. from now through June 7, and from 10 a.m. - 8 p.m. on June 8 and 9 (the first two days of registration). However, the Financial Aid Office will not be open on June 10; therefore, if you plan to apply for a waiver on the same day you plan to register, be sure to do it on June 8 or 9.
