ASSOCIATE DEGREES MEAN MONEY (Excerpt from the "AACJC Newsletter")

The economic benefits of the associate degree have become well documented. In the past year we have reported on two separate studies that have highlighted the fact that associate degree recipients earn far greater salaries than high school graduates.

An Ohio University study reported that the typical associate degree grad earned about twice as much annually as the high school grad. The Census Bureau reported an associate degree recipient could expect to earn \$3,600 more per year than a person with only a high school diploma.
