Congratulations to Claim Jumpers Aaron Howell, guard, and Alvin Brown, center. They qualified to play in the North-South California All-Star game March 9 at UC Irvine, where the North beat the South 166-152. Howell scored 21 points including five 3-pointers and Brown 17. During the California Community College Men's Basketball tournament March 7-9, both Howell and Brown were named to the All-State Team. This is the first time in one season that two Columbia College basketball players were so honored and the eighth straight season Columbia has been represented on the All-State team. Howell and Brown were chosen by a vote of California Community College Basketball Coaches.

The honors don't stop there. Howell was named Coast Valley Conference Player of the Year this season and Brown was No. 2 in the voting. Howell was a runner up in voting for the Northern California Player of the Year to guard Tony Amundsen of Chabot in Hayward. Howell is Columbia's all-time scoring leader for both season and career. He scored 798 points this season and 1,223 in his two-year career. The six footer from Sonora High holds Columbia's three-point shooting record with 171 this season (no. 2 in the state) and 278 for his career. Howell also holds Columbia records for this season for points in a game, twice with 43 and 48, and for 3-pointers in a game, twice with 10 and 11. Brown, a 6' 5 1/2" player from Granada Hills, made all CVC twice and in his freshman year scored 578 points, which is No. 7 on the Columbia College single season list. And more congratulations to the entire Claim Jumper team and Coach Denny Aye who finished their season with a 31-5 record, the second best in Columbia's history. For the fourth time in 5 years the team reached the Final 8. They played Cypress College in the quarterfinals at UC Irvine but couldn't hold the Chargers back and went down to defeat 74-61.
