UC DAVIS TRANSFER STUDENTS (FALL, 1993)

If you are planning to transfer to UC Davis for Fall, 1993, you may receive guaranteed admission up to one year prior to transferring by completing a Transfer Admission Agreement (TAA). Since Davis only accepts a limited number of TAA's statewide, you should make an appointment to see a counselor immediately to determine your eligibility. Fifty percent of all junior transfers to Davis will enroll by TAA, about half will enroll through regular admission. 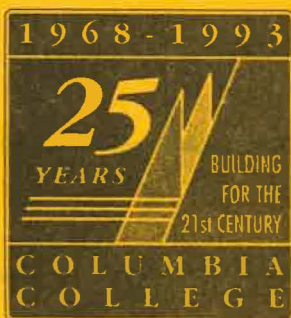

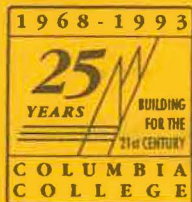

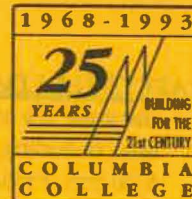
