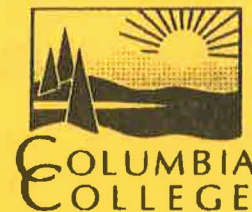

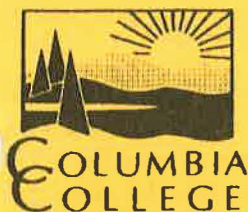

IMPORTANT NOTICE

The tables and chairs have been removed from the outside area of the Columbia College Food Services due to the Tuolumne County "CLEAN INDOOR AIR AND HEALTH PROTECTION" ordinance. Copy of ordinance is on file in the College Library at the Circulation Desk.

This county law which is being enforced in Tuolumne County states that any outside dining area is absolutely a non-smoking area.

Columbia College has determined that until a procedure to assure the compliance of this county ordinance has been developed; the removal of all tables and chairs in front of the Food Services area would be an interim measure.

We regret any inconvenience this has caused to our students and staff. Remember you and your needs are important to us!

The following are excerpts from the ordinance:

8.36.020 Definitions

3. "Dining Area" means any area (enclosed and outdoor) containing a counter or tables upon which meals are served.

8.36.090 Violations and Penalties

- A. It shall be unlawful for any person who owns, manages, operates or otherwise controls the use of any premises subject to regulation under this article to fail to comply with any of its provisions.
- B. It shall be unlawful for any person to smoke in any area where smoking is prohibited by the provisions of this article.
- C. Any person who violates any provision of this article shall be guilty of an infraction, punishable by:
 1. A fine not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100) for a first violation.
 2. A fine not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200) for a second violation
 3. A fine not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500) for each additional violation of this article within one (1) year from previous convictions

Again, we apologize for the inconvenience and are working to resolve this issue quickly.

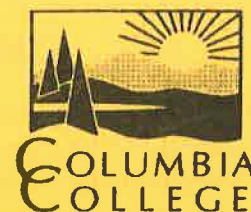

CRIME PREVENTION

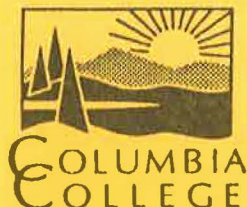

BINGE DRINKING A CAMPUS KILLER

Students play seemingly harmless drinking games, such as BLOTTO, that can lead to injury, violence, or death. One simple fact people tend to lose sight of is that alcohol is a pleasurable poison. And for a person with little experience processing this toxin, it can come as something of a physical shock.

In general, a bottle of beer has about the same alcohol content as a glass of wine or a shot of liquor. And the body can remove only the equivalent of less than one drink per hour from the bloodstream.
