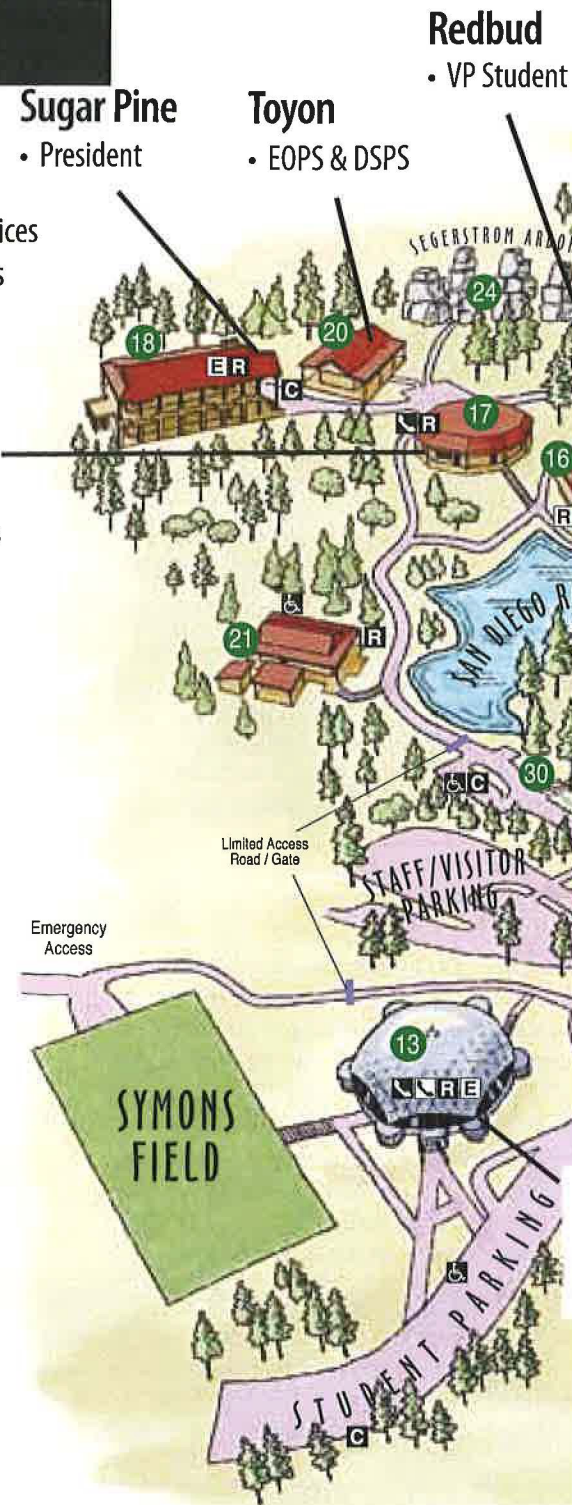

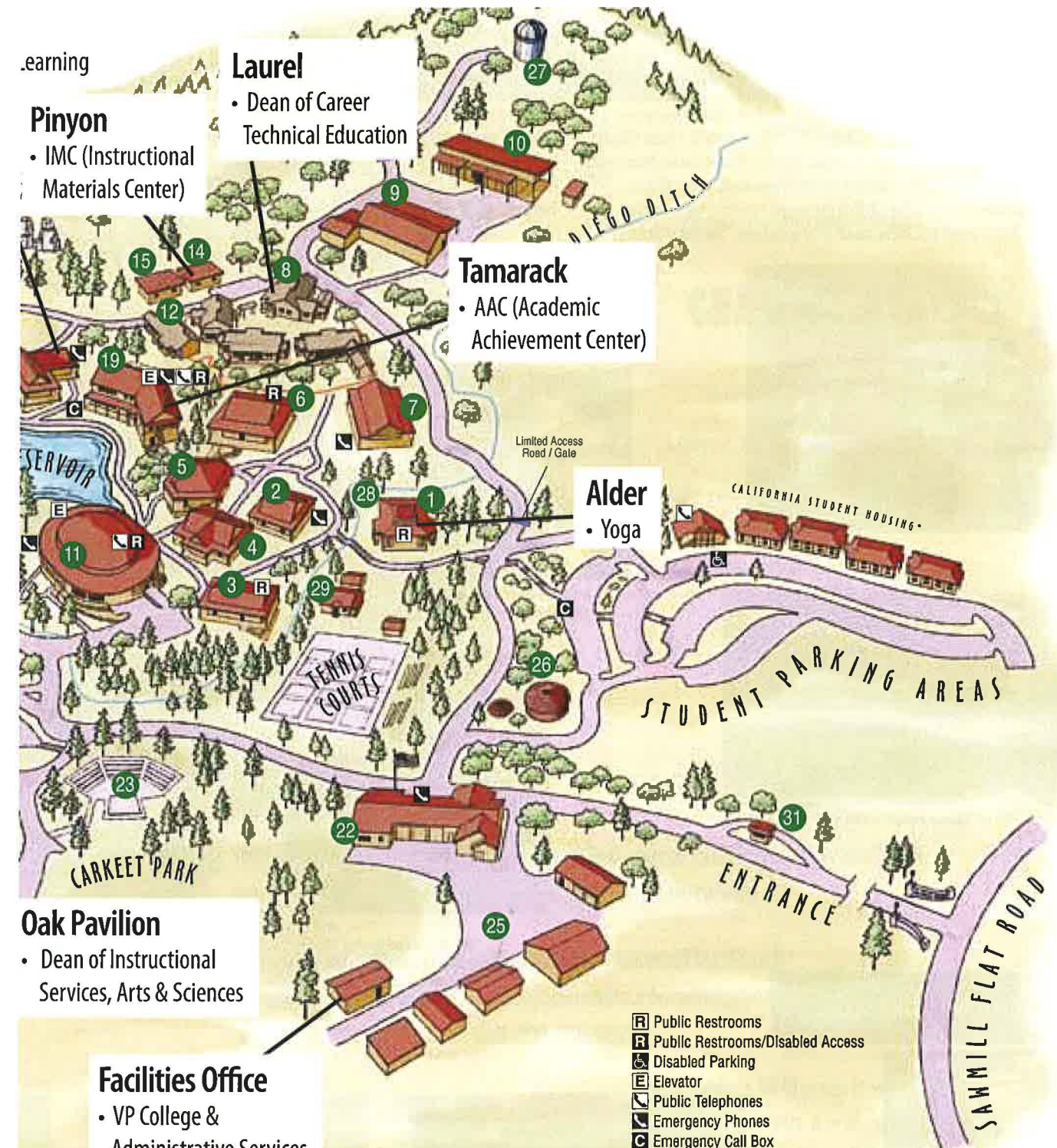

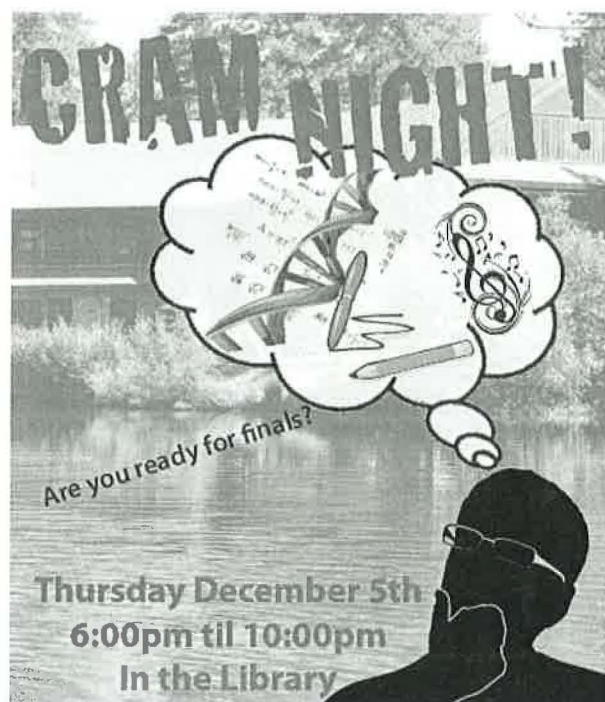

This Past November marked 75 years since Kristallnacht, the "Night of Broken Glass", the beginning of Hitler's Final Solution. On this infamous night in 1938, Nazi Stormtroopers, local police, Hitler Youth and average citizens ransacked and destroyed thousands of Jewish homes, shops, schools and synagogues in Germany and Austria, leaving the streets covered in shards of glass. Ninety-one Jews were killed that night and 30,000 Jewish men were taken away from their terrorized families.

In remembrance of Kristallnacht, I offer "Nocturne 1942", a poem set in any Jewish ghetto in any occupied European city, that tells the story of a young Jewish family's last night together before being rounded up and marched to the train station.

Nocturne 1942

Pretending for our little ones
