## PARKING

Campus parking regulations exist for the convenience, safety and protection of the total College community. Revised parking regulations are effective August 15, 1994. Be sure to obtain a copy of the revisions available at the Information Booth on Columbia College Drive, the Business Office, Admissions Office or Library.

## DOMESTIC ANIMALS

In the interest of preserving the wildlife aspects of the College setting and ensuring humane treatment of animals, all domestic animals are banned from the Columbia College campus with the exception of Guide/Helping dogs.

## DISABLED PARKING

Parking in disabled parking areas is restricted at **all times** to use by persons who qualify under the California Vehicle code. Display of a DMV authorized placard or license plate is required. Any unauthorized use of such area is a violation of California Vehicle code **subject to a fine of \$275**.

## FIFTEEN MINUTE PARKING

The green curb marked area near the Manzanita building is limited to 15 minute parking and is available to anyone requiring a very brief access to the building.

## NURSE'S ON-CAMPUS HOURS

The college nurse, Dee Hall RN, is on campus Monday-Thursday, 9:00-3:00 and Friday, 9:00-1:00. The Health Services Office (nurse's office) is located in Juniper 3. If you are ill, injured, curious about a health topic --- see the Nurse!

## TO SURVIVE THE HEAT SAFELY

Heat exhaustion and heatstroke are serious problems caused by heat stress. The college nurse recommends that students use the following guidelines to help prevent heat-related illness:

Limit your activity - reserve vigorous exercise for the early morning or evening.

Drink plenty of fluids - water, fruit or vegetable juices. Avoid alcohol and caffeine drinks.

Avoid the sun - Walk in the shade as much as possible, walk at a leisurely pace, wear a wide-brimmed hat or carry an umbrella to shade you.

Keep your rooms cool - if for some you cannot keep your house cool, try to find another cool place to stay during the hottest part of the day.

Select the right clothing - wear lightweight, loose-fitting clothes that let the air through (no polyester or wool). Wear light colors that will reflect the heat rather than absorb it.

Take frequent cool showers or baths - not very easily done if you are at the college all day, but do what you have to do to keep cool.

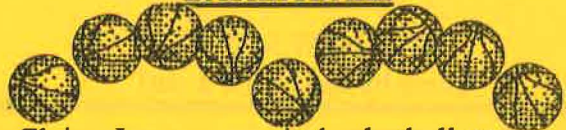
